



FIELD TRIPS

Celebrate Art and Storytelling with a Field Trip to The Carle!

Engage students in hands-on, inquiry-based learning through our immersive field trip programs. Each 90-minute guided visit includes time to explore the galleries and create art in the Art Studio. Guided tours are available on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays, and can be customized for all age groups.

Class visits to The Eric Carle Museum of Picture

Book Art align closely with the Massachusetts Visual Arts Curriculum Framework by offering students immersive, hands-on experiences that support key artistic practices in the areas of creating, responding, presenting, and connecting. Through guided tours of exhibitions and participatory studio art workshops, students experiment with a range of materials and techniques, reflect on their own work and that of others, and gain experience with the elements and principles of design. The Museum's focus on picture book art provides rich opportunities for students to connect visual storytelling with language learning. Children deepen their understanding of scientific concepts through creating and discussing their own illustrations, visually demonstrating their learning.

These visits also align with the Massachusetts English Language Arts and Literacy Framework, encouraging close observation, inference, narrative comprehension, and oral and written expression. Students analyze visual texts, make connections between images and words, and engage in discussions that build vocabulary and support interpretation—skills central to reading comprehension and effective communication. In writing or sharing responses to artwork, they practice organizing ideas, supporting opinions with evidence, and using descriptive language.

Additionally, The Carle's programs support goals outlined in the National Core Arts Standards (NCAS) and the Common Core State Standards (CCSS) for English Language Arts, both of which emphasize interdisciplinary learning, literacy across content areas, and the development of 21st-century skills such as critical thinking and creativity. By integrating visual and verbal storytelling, class visits to The Carle foster deep, standards-based learning that supports student growth across multiple disciplines.

Guided Field Trips

Tuesdays are available by request and are ideal for groups larger than 50, since the Museum is closed to the public.

- \$10 Admission for Students/Youths
- For Guided Programs, a \$25 Guide Fee is applied to each group of 25 Students/Youths.
- We suggest 1 chaperone for every 6 students. Chaperones are admitted free of charge.
- Additional adults above the chaperone ratio will be charged adult admission (\$15). One-on-one aides are admitted free of charge and are not included in the chaperone ratio.

EXPLORE, IMAGINE, PLAY

Grades: Pre-K and K
Duration: 30-40 minutes

Join Carle educators for this fun, interactive program encouraging creativity, gross motor skills, and language development! Participate in an interactive storytime and engage in storytelling through imaginative play, creative movement, singing, and exploration of materials.

I SEE A STORY: ALL ABOUT ERIC CARLE

Grades: PreK – Grade 3
Duration: 40 minutes

Join us for this interactive program and learn about the Museum from a Carle educator as you go behind the scenes to discover how Eric Carle transformed ideas, words, and pictures to create the books we love!

INSPIRED BY PICTURE BOOKS: COLLAGE

Grades: PreK –12
Duration: 45 minutes

Explore the art form of collage in this hands-on workshop with Carle Art Educators. Working with picture book illustrations, including the artwork of Eric Carle- this workshop explores how paper can be used to tell stories. Educator-led activities encourage students to explore the potential of paper as a sculptural medium, tearing, cutting, arranging, and attaching papers together to create their own works of art.

INSPIRED BY PICTURE BOOKS: DRAWING

Grades: PreK – 12 Duration: 45 minutes

Celebrate drawing in this hands-on workshop! Picture books provide inspiration as we explore how drawings can express feelings, generate a sense of movement, and create settings for stories. Carle Art Educators facilitate a series of drawing games designed to spark the creative process and encourage students' own storytelling.

WHOLE BOOK APPROACH

Location: Virtual | October 14 & 21, 2025 6 - 7:30 pm\$50 Non-Members/\$42.50 Museum Members

(3 PDPs) In this workshop, participants learn to critically evaluate the picture book as an art form, using this deeper understanding to create more engaging and interactive reading experiences. This approach serves as a foundation for designing and enriching reading experiences that foster curiosity, dialogue, and connection with young readers.

EXPLORING RACE & REPRESENTATION IN PICTURE BOOKS

(3 PDPs) Learn how to use picture books to provide "mirrors and windows" that reflect readers' identities and open their eyes to the world beyond their lived experiences. While visiting *The Art of Grace Lin:* Meeting a Friend in an Unexpected Place exhibition, we discuss book selection criteria and strategies for engaging children in conversations about race at storytime. We also share tools and other resources for building equitable, inclusive book collections.

EXPLORING MATERIALS: MARK-MAKING IN NATURE

(2 PDPs) Discover how simple marks: lines, dots, patterns, drawn on a surface, can be a powerful tool for self-expression, motor skill development, and creative expression. Surrounded by nature, participants engage in drawing activities, demonstrations, and playful games using a wide variety of accessible materials. No experience necessary—just a curiosity for the creative process



GROUP WORKSH PS

The Carle offers a variety of workshops for schools and districts as professional development opportunities.

Open Book, Open Play: Engaging Toddlers and Preschoolers in Storytime

This workshop provides tools to engage young children in book sharing and imaginative play. Through this approach, children develop verbal and visual literacy as well as fine and gross motor skills.

The Whole Book Approach

Discover the difference between reading to children and reading with children. The Whole Book Approach was developed by former Carle educator Megan Dowd Lambert, author of Reading Picture Books With Children. Her work helps adults create an active, discussion-based reading experience for children that builds observation and critical thinking skills.

Wordless Picture Books

How does one "read" a book without words? Discover how wordless pictures help readers of all ages and abilities by inviting them to look closely, share ideas, and engage in collaborative storytelling.

Exploring Race and Representation in Picture Books

Learn how to select picture books that reflect the lives and identities of all. We'll survey the range of representation in recent picture books, discuss how to use books to talk about race, and share tools for how to build a book collection that fosters inclusivity.

Little Books, Big Feelings: Picture Books and Social-Emotional Learning

What stories do we tell to create safe and supportive learning spaces? This workshop explores how to use picture books to help young people identify and manage emotions, navigate relationships, and cope with difficult situations.

Exploring Materials: PaperJoin Carle Art Educators for a hands-on and discussion-based

workshop that takes a careful look at how just one material, paper, can inspire a wide range of creative experiences. Materials used—such as paper and drawing tools—are easy to find around the home.

Exploring Materials: Mark-Making

This workshop explores the accessible medium of drawing and how it fosters self-expression and motor skills in children through discussions and drawing games with everyday materials.
